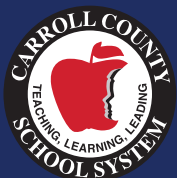
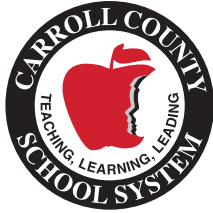

The Carroll County School District is located 50 miles west of Atlanta and is the 24th largest school system in the State of Georgia. The District offers premier educational opportunities to approximately 15,000 students throughout its 23 schools and two College and Career Academy sites.

Carroll County School System is the only district in the state to have two College and Career Academy campuses. Each campus offers 9 premier pathways of study to support the college and career readiness initiative of Carroll County Schools. In addition to programs offered at the CCA locations, all five high schools have Business and Computer Science, as well as Agriculture Education.



MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

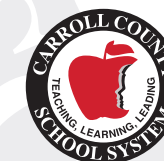
Welcome to the Carroll County School System! Our vision is to be recognized as a premier school district and our purpose is to positively change lives.
